# 5<sup>th</sup> Asia-Pacific Regional Conference on Service-Learning "Love Journey: Community Engagement through Service-Learning"

27<sup>th</sup> May to 29<sup>th</sup> May, 2015

The Asia-Pacific Regional Conference on Service-Learning, a biennial event first launched in 2007, stressed on the advancement of the "Theory and Practice of Service-Learning" in the Asia-Pacific region. The second conference, held in 2009, discussed multi-community development and cross-border communication. The third conference, taking place in 2011, emphasized the differences and impacts facilitated by Service-Learning. As to the recent fourth conference in 2013, Service-Learning was regarded as a bridge connecting the contemporary and the future. With love as the designated theme, the upcoming fifth conference in 2015 titled "Love Journey: Community Engagement through Service-Learning".

- The specific connections between those who serve, service objects, service regions and Service-Learning Modes
- Corresponding to the above discussion, process and establishment of evaluation for Service-Learning Modes
- 5. International and intercultural issues on Service-Learning
- Discussion of the impact of international /cross-cultural Service-Learning on students' learning
- The implementation of service learning programs influenced by overseas service-Learning experiences
- Discussion of the international cooperative models
- 6. Outcomes and experiences of K-12 and higher education collaborative programs
- K-12 students' experiences in participating Service-Learning programs
- Different programs in Universities that initiate K-12 schools' involvement in Service-Learning

### **Guidelines for Abstract Submission**

- All abstract shall be submitted and presented in English, typed in Arial font size 12 with double spacing.
- The length of the abstract must not exceed 350 words and it should be submitted to the committee by 15<sup>th</sup> December, 2014. Author's full names and affiliations must be specified; surnames should be in bold.
- Handwritten abstracts will not be accepted. Abstracts must be saved as documents attachment in MS word (.doc/.docx), and uploaded through the conference website.
- Presenting authors will be notified via e-mail, the status of their abstracts, prior to 30<sup>th</sup> January, 2015.
- All presenters must register for the conference before 1<sup>st</sup> May, 2015.

### **Presentation Categories**

Presenters are given a variety of program formats to choose. On the submission of the proposals, presentation formats should be indicated as well. The conference secretariat will determine whether the abstract is accepted for presentation or not in the conference. The options are as follows:

### <u>Paper Presentations (20 minutes)</u>

Presenters will conduct formal oral presentations share a session with two-to-three other presenters on similar topics. Presenters should plan for 20 minutes for their presentation. A short time will be reserved at the end of the session for questions and summarization.

### Panel Presentations (60 minutes)

A group of papers on similar themes or research issues proposed as a complete session. Those presenting within this option should submit a group proposal involving up to three presentations. A recommended discussant should also be named in the proposal. A panel presentation should take 45 minutes, with 15 minutes for discussion.

# Interactive Workshops (60 minutes)

An interactive session allows active involvement of audience participants throughout the presentation. Workshops should engage the audience in sharing collaborative expertise in one or more of the Conference Themes. It maybe problem-based or have a disciplinary or cross-cultural focus. One or several individuals may participate. Participants in these sessions gain new ideas and knowledge they may apply in their own work.

### Poster Presentations (90 minutes)

These sessions will provide an opportunity for the author to display information on their initiatives and achievements in the field. In this format, presenters talk informally with participants who come to their boards. Free standing poster display boards are provided for speakers. Details about poster presentations are provided to the author after acceptance of his or her poster proposal. Presenters may bring printed materials for free distribution.

### **Keynote Speakers**

### Prof. Joseph A. Erickson

Professor, Augsburg College Education Department

Licensed Psychologist, Associated Clinic of Psychology, Minneapolis, Minnesota



Joseph A. Erickson is Professor of Education at Augsburg College in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He is also a licensed psychologist in private practice. He earned his doctorate in educational psychology at the University of Minnesota. He was a member and former chair of the Minneapolis School Board.

In March 2006, Erickson was honored as one of the "100 District Leaders for Citizenship and Service-Learning" by the Education Commission of the States — National Center for Learning and Citizenship for his leadership in civic education and commitment to community service-learning. He

has written and co-written several articles and book chapters on the topic of service-learning's impact on attitude change and has co-edited two books on service-learning in teacher education, including the 2013 publication, *Transforming Teacher Education through Service-Learning*, coedited with Virginia Jagla and Alan Tinkler (published by Information Age Publishing). He has also presented at several international education conferences, including presentations in Paris (2011) and Galway, Ireland (2009).

He continues his work and conducts research primarily in effective teaching strategies, attitude change, and the use of technology for enhancing learning. He is chair of the Board of Directors of the International Center for Service-Learning in Teacher Education, located at Duke University in Durham, North Carolina.

#### Dr.Rajesh Tandon

President, Participatory Research in Asia

UNESCO Chair in community based research and social responsibility in higher education



Dr. Rajesh Tandon is the Co-Chair, UNESCO Chair on Community-based Research and Social Responsibility in Higher Education. The University of Victoria, Canada, awarded him the 'Doctor of Laws' in June 2008 in recognition of his pioneering work in the area of civic engagement, governance and community based research. Dr. Tandon is also the co-editor of the forthcoming GUNI Report on "Engagement, Knowledge & Higher Education: Rethinking Social Responsibility" (2013).

He is the co-founder & President of Participatory Research in Asia (PRIA), New Delhi. Under his leadership and over the past 30 years, PRIA has been working towards the empowerment of the poor and marginalized such that they can collectively claim their rights and organize for self-reliant development. He is a pioneer in innovative methodologies in participatory research, participatory planning, monitoring & evaluation.

Dr. Tandon has provided leadership on the Governing Boards of dozens of national and international civil society organizations over the past 35 years. He served as President of Asia & South Pacific Basic & Adult Education Association (ASPBAE) 1992-2000; Vice-President of International Council of Adult Education (ICAE) 1986-1992; founder of CIVICUS and its Chair of the Board 1996-99; founder — Chair of International Forum of Capacity Building of Southern NGOs (1997-2001); founder & Chair of FimForum for Democratizing Global Governance. His expertise has been sought by UNDP, World Bank, UNICEF, UNV, WHO, ILO and others. He was also invited to lead Citizens & Governance Program of the Commonwealth Foundation during 2001-04.

Dr. Tandon has also served in numerous committees of the Government of India (its various Ministries and agencies), the most recent one being the Task force of the Planning Commission preparing for the 12<sup>th</sup> Five Year Plan on "Strengthening Community Engagement of Institutions of Higher Education". Dr. Tandon has contributed frequently to scholarly journals, practitioner manuals, audio-visuals on a wide range of themes---participatory research, people-centered development, civil society, democratic governance, active citizenship. He has also authored and coedited several books, the most recent of them being: Globalizing Citizens (2010), Civil Society & Governance (2003), Reviving Democracy (2003), Voluntary Action, Civil Society & the State (2002).

Project Coordinator nexus II: "Forming Transitions, Promoting Student Success" at the German Rector's Conference



Dr. Phil Peter A. Zervakis coordinates the Project nexus II — Forming Transitions, Promoting Student Success at the German Rector's Conference (HRK) in Bonn since July 2014. Prior to this, from 2006, he headed the "Bologna projects" of the HRK supporting German universities in implementing Bachelor and Master study-programs. From 2004-06 he was Head of research projects on Greater Europe at the Bertelsmann Foundation in Gütersloh and from 1999-2004, he worked as a Research Fellow

at the Centre for European Integration Studies at the University of Bonn.

Dr. Zervakis has enriched the educational debate in Germany by emphasizing the relevance of introducing "service learning" in Bachelor and Master programs as a valuable addition to classical teaching formats – as a benefit for students to learn in social settings while at the same time opening up universities to the needs of society. Thus, he has edited several volumes with good practice, including "Committed Universities. Strong in research, skills-focused and active in society" (2014), "Master's Programs – Models of Success. Open to international cooperation and individual educational biographies" (2012), and "Good Teaching. Fresh Wind in the Sails of German Higher Education" (2011). Among his articles are "Dawn or Dusk- The Bologna Process from the Perspective of German Higher Education", in Going Global: The Landscape for Policy Makers and Practitioners in Tertiary Education (2012), "The Introduction of the Bachelor in Germany", in "The Bachelor – Changes in Performance and Quality of Studying- Empirical Evidence in International Comparison" (2010). Dr. Zervakis received his PhD in Modern and Contemporary History from Hamburg University where he also completed his post-doctorate. He regularly contributes articles on the reform of German HE under the frame of the "Bologna Process". He is a national Bologna expert for Trends reports of the European University Association, a member of the expert council for the College of the Brandenburg Technical University Cottbus-Senftenberg as well as an evaluator of the University of Potsdam.
